# STRATEGIES TO MANAGE AND PROTECT UNMADE ROADS - SUMMARY OF SURVEYED ROADS

# **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

PURPOSE OF REPORT:	To report to Council on strategies to manage and protect unmade roads.
BACKGROUND:	Council has 99 unmade roads of which 52 occur in bushland.
COMMENTS:	Management of unmade roads rests with Open Space and Technical Services. As part of a longer term strategy to secure the future of the unmade roads as bushland, it may be necessary to either close the roads and/or reallocate responsibility to Open Space where the value of the bushland is high.
RECOMMENDATION:	That the unmade roads located within bushland be managed by Open Space and closure be considered on a priority basis following a detailed site review.

# **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To report to Council on strategies to manage and protect unmade roads.

# BACKGROUND

The 2003/04 Management Plan required a report be prepared for the consideration of Council on strategies to manage and protect unused roads. This report seeks to address this task by identifying unmade roads, taking into account their future needs and existing zoning. Particular focus has been given to those unmade roads in bushland. This reflects the objective behind the task to "retain and restore the quality and connectivity of terrestrial and aquatic habitats".

An unmade road is a road that is unformed. This means that it has no kerb or gutter or formed surface. It is quite possible that cars might still be able to use it, although in most cases unmade roads still contain uncleared natural vegetation and are therefore unusable for traffic particularly those within bushland.

Unmade roads occur for a variety of reasons. Often it is because a residential development was planned but not constructed, or the development was only partly completed. Sometimes unmade roads are a result of superior alternative routes being developed. They can also occur because of budget restraints not permitting their immediate construction.

There are a number of mechanisms to deal with unmade roads that depend on the status of the umade road. Where an unmade road is classified as a public road under the *NSW Roads Act 1993*, Council must make an application to the Minister for Roads under Section 34 of the *Roads Act* to remove the said road. If the application is successful the Minister "may by notice, published in the Gazette, close the public road concerned". The effect of this decision is to allow the existing uses permitted under the zoning to occur without consequence of the impacts of a future road and associated infrastructure.

An unmade road can also be considered as a "paper road", being recognised as a potential road during the development of a subdivision plan, though never recognised as a public road under the *Roads Act*. In this situation the unmade road is likely to have its own lot and deposit plan number, and be identified on Council's planning map. The ownership of these unmade roads may rest with Council or the State (Crown), depending on the status of the land ownership at the time of the subdivision plan. To remove these unmade roads would require a similar approach to that of public roads, although the final decision rests with Council, not the Minister of Roads.

As part of the review, 99 unmade roads have been identified. These have been divided into three groups: Group 1 containing those unmade roads that were entirely located within Council managed Open Space areas and consequently zoned as Open Space (6A); Group 2 are unmade roads zoned as roads under Council's Planning Scheme Ordinance; and Group 3 are unmade roads located within and zoned as Residential 2 (C). The table below summaries the numbers and existing land use management affecting the unmade roads. It should be noted that roads are permitted in all zones.

Management of unmade roads rests with either Technical Services or Open Space. Where the unmade roads are located in bushland, it is usually managed by Council's bushland section. Exceptions exist where an unmade road portion is zoned as a road and occurs outside a continuous stretch of bushland.

# COMMENTS

The intention of this report is to prepare and implement effective programs and strategies to minimise the impacts of activities that damage habitats and assist in the protection of threatened species. This reflects concern that some unmade roads may promote inappropriate development that would otherwise present a risk to the long term management of bushland and associated habitats.

A preliminary review of all the unmade roads was undertaken in terms of their bushland value (Attachment 1). This review considered the current zoning; the vegetation associations; whether endangered flora or fauna was present or formed part of an endangered vegetation community; if it had potential as a bushland corridor; its significance for asset protection relating to bushfire hazard; and whether it was within a bushcare site.

An extension to this assessment sought to prioritise the unmade roads on the basis of their environmental and social significance. Attachment 2 provides the results of this prioritisation. Scores were given to each site according to:

- 1. whether they occur in a natural area, park, sportsground or golfcourse (Max 20)
- 2. if endangered flora and fauna has been recorded (20)
- 3. whether the site forms part of a potential bushland corridor (10)

- 4. if it can be utilised as a strategic site for asset protection (10)
- 5. if a bush care site is present (15)

In determining the most appropriate form of long term management, consideration was initially given to those unmade roads managed by Open Space. In most situations the current management, be it through noxious weed control, fire management, regeneration or bushcare is sufficient to ensure vegetation and habitats sustain into the future. Notwithstanding this response, there are some sites where reclassifying or renaming the unmade road to bushland may prove beneficial. This can be investigated on a priority basis as identified in Attachment 2.

Where an unmade road occurs in bushland and is zoned as Road, consideration is given to its day to day management and the expertise in the organisation to manage these parcels. In all situations the medium term option is to transfer the maintenance to Open Space.

Closing the road or removal of it from the Planning Scheme Ordinance should be a long term strategy for only those roads under particular threat. Presently it is not considered that this option be taken across all sites, given the resources and time involved unless on a site by site basis. Rather it is recommended that 4 sites per year be reviewed, reflecting the priority given in Attachment 2, till such time as the long term future can be satisfied.

# CONSULTATION

As part of the review and identification of unmade roads in bushland, the Ku-ring-gai Natural Areas Advisory Committee was consulted and briefed on the development of this report. It would also be expected that if Council supports to seek "closure" of any roads following a review that such deliberations be referred to the new Bushland, Catchments and Natural Areas Reference Group. Other consultation with the public would also occur through Council's website, with the Ku-ringgai Bushcare Association and other local environment groups. Formal notification processes would be required to residents living and managing properties immediately adjoining an unmade road if formal closure was sought.

# FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

The rezoning of unmade roads is likely to impact on three departments of Council, Open Space, Technical Services and Planning and Environment. In this respect and given existing priorities, up to four unmade roads can be reviewed each year. Changes in day to day management of sites in bushland to Open Space are unlikely to have significant impact.

## SUMMARY

There are 99 unmade roads across the Ku-ring-gai local government area. Fifty two of these are located within bushland and managed by Open Space. Forty seven of these are also located mostly within bushland and managed by Technical Services. Given the resources to either close or remove from the Planning Scheme Ordinance an unmade road, it is recommended in the first instance that Open Space assume day to day management responsibility for all unmade roads in bushland and then up to four sites be investigated each year as to their potential and value for reclassifying.

## RECOMMENDATION

- A. That Council receive and note the report.
- B. That unmade roads occurring in Bushland be managed by Open Space.
- C. That the four highest priority unmade roads be reviewed each year for reclassification.

However, the Local Government Act has been amended by the Local Government Amendment (Mayoral Elections) Act 2004 to extend the term of the <u>Mayor</u> until September 2005. The legislation did not include any extension for the current Deputy Mayoral term.

## COMMENTS

The Department of Local Government Circular (No 04/35) advises that it is a discretionary matter for Councils to decide whether or not to extend the term of office of the Deputy Mayor to September 2005 or to elect a new Deputy Mayor in September 2004.

Nevertheless, Council did resolve on 13 April 2004 that the current Deputy Mayoral term be until September 2004. It will require a subsequent Council resolution to vary this.

Should Council decide to hold an election for the position then Council will need to determine the meeting in September 2004 at which the election of the Deputy Mayor is to be held.

Traditionally, Council has held this election on the first or second Tuesday in September. It should also be noted that the third Tuesday of the month, there is no Council meeting and the fourth Tuesday falls within the school holiday period.

Councils and Regional Organisations of Councils are encouraged to submit motions on issues of national importance for debate. In particular, we are seeking Notices of Motions in the areas of population and ageing, local government financing, environment, and infrastructure.

# Motions should be received by ALGA no later than Friday 10 September 2004.

As in previous years, the ALGA Executive will develop composite motions to reduce the total number of motions under consideration. The ALGA Executive reserves the right to vet whether motions are applicable to the Assembly debate.

This year, in response to delegate requests, the structure of debate has been altered to allow greater participation, but retain the time dedicated to debate. Two concurrent sessions have been programmed on Monday 8 November, 2004. The first concurrent debating session will be population and ageing and local government financing; with the second concurrent debating session being environment and infrastructure. In addition, there will be plenary debating sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday.

# **Voting Procedures**

Each Council is entitled to one voting delegate at each concurrent debating session and one voting delegate in each plenary debating session. Councils will need to determine who their voting delegates will be in each case. Councils are encouraged to send at least two delegates so that they can be fully represented in all concurrent debating sessions of interest to them.

The outcomes of voting in the concurrent debating sessions will be summarised by the Chairs of those sessions and will be debated by exception in the plenary debating session beginning on Tuesday. Voting cards will be distributed at the National Convention Centre beginning 9:00 am Sunday 7 November 2004 and throughout registration.

### PROFESSOR DEAN JAENSCH AO

Dean Jaensch is Professor in the School of Political and International Studies at Flinders University. He is the author and co-author of 25 books and numerous chapters and articles, mainly on Australian politics, including The Politics of Australia (MacMillan), Power Politics: The Australian Party System (Allen and Unwin) and The MacMillan Dictionary of Australian Politics (MacMillan). He is widely involved in public political education and is a regular political commentator and analyst in the Australian media. Professor Jaensch has also carried out numerous consultancies, including for local government, and he is constantly involved with speaking to a wide range of groups and organisations on the topic of Australian politics. He is a Life Member of the Australian Political Studies Association.

### DR HUGH MACKAY

Hugh Mackay is a psychologist, social researcher and writer who has made a lifelong study of the attitudes and behaviour of the Australian community. He has also written five books in the field of social psychology: Reinventing Australia, The Good Listener, Generations, Turning Point and Media Mania. His latest book is Right and Wrong: How to decide for yourself (Hodder, 2004). Hugh is a graduate of the University of Sydney and Macquarie University and a Fellow of the Australian Psychological Society. In recognition of his pioneering work in social research, he has been awarded honorary doctorates by New South Wales, Macquarie and Charles Sturt universities. He is a regular contributor to newspapers, radio and television, and is the author of four novels: Little Lies, House Guest, The Spin and Winter Close.

### MR BOB HOGG AO

Bob Hogg has had a long and distinguished career with the Australian Labor Party, serving as ALP National Secretary between 1988 and 1993 and senior adviser to the then Prime Minister, Bob Hawke, in 1983--86. He was Secretary of the Victorian Branch of the ALP in 1976-83 and a consultant to the Victorian Premier in 1986-87. He was Deputy Chairman of the Singleton Group in 1993--98 and is currently an independent consultant in issues management and a columnist for the Australian Financial Review .He is also a director of Australian Health International and the Snowy Hydro Corporation. He was appointed to the Order of Australia in 1995.

### MR GRAHAME MORRIS

Grahame Morris, is a partner in the public relations company, Jackson Wells Morris, and is a former Chief of Staff to Prime Minister John Howard and adviser to many other political leaders. He held key positions in federal and state politics for two decades, was involved in many of the significant public policy issues of the last 20 years and has devised and executed election campaigns, communications programs end policy platforms. He is a former Strategic Policy Director for News Ltd, trained journalist and has lectured in political communications as a Myer Fellow at Pennsylvania State University. He is a regular media commentator on issues relating to government and community attitudes.

### DR ROSEMARY KISS

Rosemary Kiss is a senior fellow in the Department of Political Science at the University of Melbourne. Her main fields of study have been in the areas of government and public policy. During the 1980s she was employed in the Victorian state public service in policy and program development positions connected with public housing. Her local government experience includes a period as a councillor at the City of Fitzroy (now part of the City of Yarra), over eight years as a member of the Victorian Local Government Grants Commission (the VGC), and appointments to two Good Governance Task Forces. She has also held an Australian Research Council and Municipal Association of Victoria funded post - doctoral fellowship which enabled her to continue her research on Australian local government.

### MR MATTHEW REILLY

With over two million books sold worldwide in fifteen languages, Matthew Reilly is a phenomenal success. Born in Sydney in 1974 he studied Law at the University of New South Wales and is the author of *Ice Station, Temple, Contest,* Area 7, *Scarecrow* and the online novel *Hover Car Racer.* Matthew visits Los Angeles three times a year on movie-related business, but still lives in Sydney. He has also directed three short films.

### MAYOR JOY LEISHMAN

Caboolture Shire Mayor Joy Leishman is the driving force behind one of the fastest-growing regions in Australia, an area fast becoming known as the lifestyle capital of southeast Queensland. Mayor Leishman is head of the progressive local government authority that boasts an annual budget in excess of \$145 million and a population of 120,000 people, more than half of which arrived in the last 10 years alone. Several national and international companies have shown their confidence in the leadership of Mayor Leishman and the strong local economy by opening for business in the Shire. She is a strong advocate for structured development in the Shire and a firm believer that a commitment to controlled growth will continue to firmly enhance the motto of Caboolture Shire, "Where Lifestyle Really Counts'. Mayor Leishman has recently started her second term as Mayor after being returned in March 2004. She was previously a divisional councillor for two terms and the first female Deputy Chairman of the Shire. Her extensive community Involvement is well regarded throughout the community.

# Symposia

### Sustainable Transport

Australia's transport systems are increasingly being forced to compete for scarce public funding. So what can be done to make transport services more sustainableeconomically, socially and environmentally? And what is local government's role in this?

Transport sustainability is relevant to all areas of Australia. In cities, 'density' causes problems of congestion, noise and pollution. Is an integrated land use and transport planning framework the answer? How important is travel demand management? In regional and rural areas, 'distance' is the issue. How sustainable are long-distance public transport services; whether rail, coach, air or shipping?

This symposium will feature national experts in transport policy, planning and research. They will debate these issues, providing options for more transport sustainability and suggestions on how local government can influence the development of sustainable transport systems that work for local communities.

### Social Policy: Ageing Strategy

Australia faces a significant ageing of its population over the coming decades. This represents important opportunities for local government, as older people make an enormous contribution to local communities; but population ageing has a range of impacts on planning and service delivery, which present challenges for local government.

Many local councils have a strong commitment to population ageing and have developed, or are Initiating the development of, local level responses. The next step for local government is to build on these activities. This symposium will explore some of the strategies local government might undertake to address population ageing. The aim is to help local government meet the challenges and take full advantage of the opportunities presented by an ageing population.

#### **Connecting Local Government**

During the last three years ALGA and the State Local Government Associations have been implementing Networking the Nation (NTN) funded projects to improve the capacity of local government use of information communication technology (ICI). During this session you will hear about the progress that has been made, and be briefed on the Directional Roadmap for local government use of ICT over the next ten years. The workshop will include:

1. Report on the outcomes of the Networking the Nation funded projects 2. Report on the Directional Roadmap

3. Roundtable discussion of report and implications

#### The Fourth R: Radiation

Site Management Alliance is concerned with the business of radiation safety at radio communications sites for workers and the community. Most Council sites are likely to be noncompliant with the applicable Australian standard. This session will set out practical and cost effective online solutions to the legal and policy issues raised by decisions from the Australian Communications Authority (ACA) and ARPANSA. It will detail law and policy, process, outcomes and costs.

Site Management Alliance provides online information about radiation safety for the community and also provides training and employment opportunities for local business. They are NATA and ACA accredited. In this session you will see online demonstrations of their software capacity. The issue is occupational health and safety, and you are invited to engage with their solution. For a preview visit the website www.sitemanager.net.au.

### Participate -Regulate -Facilitate!

Does your Council have a youth strategy? Do you think you need one? How does your council involve its younger citizens in the decision-making process? How does your council create an environment that encourages youth to stay in the community as participating and positive young citizens? What can your council do to encourage jobs creation and cultural diversity? Speakers at this symposium will investigate these issues and suggest strategies for local government engagement with its younger citizens. It will showcase youth policy initiatives that go beyond the regulation of public space and look at alternatives to negative policies that perceive young people as a problem, rather than a community asset. Included within this session will be a presentation by the Beacon Foundation, showcasing its innovative approach to real job creation for unemployed, local youth. Beacon will detail its current replication projects with four councils across Australia. Delegates attending this symposium will gain information on how their council might develop its own youth strategy that focuses on the real needs of local young citizens.

### Integrated NRM Planning

Local government nationally invests in excess of \$2.4 billion annually on environmental services. Local government is a major investor in natural resource management (NRM) and environmental protection across Australia. This symposium will look at local government's role in achieving improved environmental outcomes. It will explore some of the challenges local government is facing and the opportunities provided by national initiatives such as: the National Action Plan for Salinity; The National Heritage Trust; the National Water Initiative and coastal zone management. The session will look at the regional NRM planning processes set up under these initiatives using case studies.

### **Planning and Development**

Community control of planning and development is a fundamental tenet of local democracy. The objective of development assessment processing and planning policy is to ensure high quality built

environments that reflect the wishes of the community as a whole. Across Australia there have been numerous recent efforts to reform

development and planning policy with significant implications for local government. The Development Assessment Forum (OAF) was formed in 1998 as a national body charged to reach agreement on more effective and streamlined approaches to development assessment and decision making. A consultation program commissioned by OAF has stimulated significant public debate on the merits of current approaches to development assessment. This symposium will explore in more detail the appropriate role of local government in development assessment and current thinking on the future of community planning and the built environment.

## Open House Local Government Expo

Do you have a local issue that you want to discuss with your fellow local government colleagues? Have you got a great local solution or innovation that you wish to share with others? Do you find it hard to connect with colleagues from like-Councils when networking at the social functions?

## **PURPOSE OF REPORT**

To provide Council with additional information on the sites 1234-1274 Pacific Highway and 1 Beechworth Road, Pymble, that have previously been considered for rezoning.

## BACKGROUND

Council has considered some information on the rezoning of this site on 2 December 2003 and Council requested additional information on 29 June 2004 (see Attachment A). Since that date some additional advice has been sought.

## COMMENTS

In accordance with Council's resolution dated 2 December 2003 a site inspection was conducted by Councillors and staff on Saturday 26 June 2004 and site access was gained to the rear of No 1252 Pacific Highway, Pymble.

In addition advice has also been obtained by Council for the following matters.

### Geotechnical

Council sought the services of Douglas Partners Pty Ltd – Geotechnical, Environment and Groundwater Consultants, to review the geotechnical information for the site (see Attachment B). The assessment was based on a review of Council's Environmental Baseline Study (Conacher Travers 2000) and a report by Jeffery & Katauskas Consultants (October 2003). A site inspection was also carried out by the consultant.

### **Traffic Assessment**

Advice has been sought from Council's Strategic Traffic Engineer on the traffic, parking and access issues associated with a potential rezoning of the site, this includes parking and access analysis to/from four points along the block.

### **Vegetation Communities**

At this stage no additional information has been sought by the Planning and Environment Department on the Blue Gum High Forest on the site.

### Summary

Council has completed some of the assessment and advice in relation to the potential rezoning of 1234-1274 Pacific Highway and 1 Beechworth Road, Pymble. In addition there is a substantial amount of background information contained in Council's RDS Baseline Studies.

### REVIEW OF GEOTECHNICAL INFORMATION 1232 TO 1274 PACIFIC HIGHWAY, PYMBLE

This letter report was prepared at the request of Council to review and comment on geotechnical information and matters relevant to rezoning of the above site for medium density housing.

In summary, based on a visit to the site by the writer, knowledge of the area, and the information provided, the writer is of the opinion that there are no insurmountable geotechnical problems associated with rezoning of the site for medium density housing.

The site is underlain by the Ashfield Shale formation from within the Wianamatta Group, is moderate to steep with slopes up to about 16 degrees, has numerous tall trees, lawns and gardens on relatively large blocks around one and two storey detached, predominantly brick residences. There were no signs of significant slope instability, although many years ago there have reportedly been minor stability problems in the rail cuttings or embankments.

Development of the site including excavation for construction of a 1 to 3 level basement car park is feasible provided investigation, design and construction are carried out by competent and experienced consultants and contractors using accepted standards and procedures.

Detailed geotechnical investigation would be required prior to any future major development on this site. Investigation should include:

- Preparation of a detailed topographic survey of the site and surrounds including rail cuttings, track embankments and possibly some downslope areas;
- Geotechnical inspection and logging of the railway cuttings and review of their stability and history;
- Cored boreholes in areas of proposed significant loading or excavation across the site, some to below the level of the railway, and some with standpipe piezometers for observations of groundwater levels;
- · Testing of rock for strength and soils for reactivity, plasticity and pavement properties;
- Preparation of a geotechnical investigation report containing the results from the fields and laboratory work with recommendations for design and construction.

## SUBJECT: REZONING APPLICATION FOR THE AREA BETWEEN BEECHWORTH ROAD PYMBLE AND WARRAGAL ROAD, TURRAMURRA

I refer to the area bounded by Beechworth Road, Pacific Highway, Warragal Road and the north shore railway line. This site has an area of about 22,209m<sup>2</sup> (excluding the nursing home at 1228 Pacific Highway). The northern end of the site is located about 700m from the entrance to Turramurra railway station and the southern end of the site is about 750m from Pymble railway station.

These comments examine traffic aspects of the potential rezoning of the site to permit medium density development.

A floor space ratio of 1:1 was assumed, and the apartment split was considered to be 60% x 3 bedroom and 40% x 2 bedroom, with an average apartment size of 125 m<sup>2</sup>. The potential traffic generation from the site was calculated using the rates in the Roads and Traffic Authority's Guide to Traffic Generating Developments for medium density dwellings.

Two scenarios were examined:

- 1. The whole site is consolidated into 1 lot, with only 2 access points: 1 on Beechworth Road and 1 on Warragal Road.
- 2. The site is consolidated into 4 separate lots, loosely based on the current level of site consolidation, 4 access points would be required, 2 of which would be located off Pacific Highway.

The existing site has 20 detached dwellings, which would generate 180 vehicle trips per day (vpd) and 17 vehicles trips per hour (vph, two-way) during the peak hour. Almost all of the existing dwellings have access to Pacific Highway.

### Consolidation of Site into 1 Lot

The following table shows the potential result of consolidating the site into 1 lot:


It was assumed that this traffic generation would be distributed equally between 2 access points, located in Beechworth Road and Warragal Road. Therefore, each access point would carry 53 vehicle trips (two-way) during the peak hour. Assuming that 70% of trips are away from the development during the morning peak 37vph would be leaving each driveway and 16vph would be entering each driveway. This is not a significant traffic generation, and represents 1 vehicle leaving each driveway about every 2 minutes during the morning peak. Vehicles would be entering each driveway at the rate of about 1 every 4 minutes.

If parking was provided at the maximum rate permitted under LEP194, then 285 resident and 45 visitor parking spaces would be required. Each driveway would therefore service 165 car spaces. According to DCP43, Category 2 driveways would be required (combined entry/exit, 6.0m-9.0m wide) at each access point.

AS 2890.1 requires that access driveways be located beyond the influence of normal queue lengths at signalised intersections. Failing this, left in/left out arrangements, signalisation or other traffic management measures must be implemented. A brief inspection was undertaken during the morning peak in Beechworth Road at Pacific Highway and it was observed that the queue lengths in Beechworth Road rarely reached the westernmost end of the Beechworth Road frontage. The existing 'Left Turn on Red' assists in dissipating the left turn queues in Beechworth Road, and the signal phasing appears to be reasonably timed to reduce delays to Beechworth Road traffic. Given this, a median to restrict access to left in/left out (or other traffic control device) may not be required in Beechworth Road.

### Consolidation of the Site into 4 Separate Lots

The layout of the 4 separate lots was loosely based on the current level of site consolidation, as portrayed in a report on the transport aspects of the site by consultants Masson Wilson Twiney (27 October 2003). Relatively smaller lots would occur at the extremities of the site, with vehicular access onto Beechworth Road and Warragal Road. The larger lots would be in the middle of the site and would have vehicular access to Pacific Highway. The sketch below shows the potential site consolidation.



The table below shows potential lot sizes, resulting apartment yields and traffic generation:

Again, assuming that 70% of trips are away from the development during the morning peak, then 18vph would be leaving the Beechworth Road driveway and 8vph would be entering the Beechworth Road driveway. This is also not a significant traffic generation, and represents 1 vehicle leaving the driveway about every 3 minutes during the morning peak. Vehicles would be entering the driveway at

the rate of about 1 every 9 minutes. The demand on the Warragal Road access point during the morning peak would be 9vph leaving the driveway and 4vph entering, which is also a very low rate.

Note that this scenario would have ¼ of the impact to Warragal Road traffic flows and ½ the impact to Beechworth Road traffic flows that the former scenario would. This is because the bulk of traffic movements would have access from Pacific Highway, rather than the side streets. There is also no discount for the existing traffic generation, so net traffic generation particularly from Lots "2" and "3" would be lower.

The parking and access requirements for this scenario are detailed in the table below

Since the number of spaces served by the access point of Lot "2" nears 100, the RTA may require that this be a Category 3 driveway as well. In this scenario, the necessity for a median in Beechworth Road to restrict access to left in/left out may be even less than the previous scenario, due to the reduced demand on Beechworth Road.
